The parents were very happy, because they had prayed to God for a child for many years. When they had almost given up all hope, their prayers were answered, and they finally had a son. But what

would the fate of this boy be?

The parents already knew the future of their son, because an angel of the Lord had appeared to Zacharias in the temple and told him: Your wish has been heard. Your wife, Elizabeth, will give birth to a boy and you will call him John.
